Choosing Gratitude

You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Matthew 24:6

We have heard rumors of a virus that took hold of our world quickly. People became sick, some died, families and loved ones mourned and our nation went into lockdown. "See to it that you are not alarmed," Jesus said. We tried mightily but the constant din of bad news made us weary, and many grew discouraged. Amid discouragement can we find gratitude?

A brief summer sprinkle accompanied by errant lightning strikes caused massive fires to rage and burn with their monstrous destructive force growing to the size of Rhode Island. The pyrochemicals filled the air and reminded us of the war our brave men and women on the front lines were fighting. "See to it that you are not alarmed," but we again, easily felt overwhelmed by the taxing pace of crisis.

However, now we can reframe much of what we have experienced. That is what Thanksgiving challenges us to do. We emerge from the worst of times and cultivate a deep sense of gratitude.

Gratitude must be chosen and there is much to choose instead of gratitude - fights over whether to mask or not, to be vaccinated or not, to get a booster or not, to go to restaurants or not. Family and friends can choose to bicker over political positions that weaponized pandemic perspectives. All this is tempting but it only makes life harder.

What if we chose gratitude? What if we chose forgiveness and reconciliation? Is that not what the church should do?

Be thankful we must. Be thankful we should. Be thankful we can and are. We

are recipients of the grandest grace in the cosmos. How can we not be thankful?

We have lost much but it has given us the opportunity to pray hard for wisdom, direction, and to "not be alarmed."

We have wondered exactly what to do, how to do it, and how to decide if we are successful. Can we make disciples virtually? Can we incite a mobilization and equipping of the church to help Christ followers make an impact in their community?

The questions seemed endless; the answers seemed elusive. However, it has been over a year of deep learning for which we are thankful. What have we learned?

What Defines the Church?

First, a church is not defined by its pastor, staff, and buildings. Companies might do this, but we are not a company. We are an organic organization; we are a physical entity with a spiritual source. We are different. The church is defined by its head, Jesus and by the members and attenders. They are the church, a church for which we are thankful.

Who Is the Church's Customer?

Second, our attenders are not our customers. They are owners. The community are our customers whom we need to continually engage and serve to persuade with the Gospel.

The alternative makes owners into consumers, and customers invisible. The pandemic and other ensuing crises have showed us this clearly. We are thankful for our community.

What Are We Doing?

Our existence is linked to inviting people

in our community to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ and respond to God's grace, to awaken their faith in Jesus as personal Savior. While we love being together, we must not neglect going out and inviting, persuading, and compelling our community to join us.

We must get back to providing opportunities to deepen personal faith and commitment to Jesus Christ, grow in maturity and discipleship, and utilize our gifts and serving the local church and our community.

We exist to be a model of Jesus Christ to others, to proclaim his invitation of new life to all who will listen.

Why Do We Do This?

Our desire is to be obedient to the mandate of Jesus to teach and make disciples of all peoples. Our desire is to train and instruct ourselves and others in the Christian faith grow in likeness of Jesus. We do this because it is important for our church to be a hospitable, caring place that is attractive to our community. We do this because we value our community as a place the Holy Spirit longs to see touched by the gospel and the healing power available to them.

We Have Succeeded When ...



Then another mysterious happening occurred one night: the whole pile of cones was moved from our side of the fence to the neighbors' side! They had been somehow moved through the chain link fence where they were stacked in another orderly pile, most likely by our resident squirrels.

After an uplifting and relatively calm day on Sunday, we were awakened at 4:00 a.m. by frantic barking from the back room where TJ the lab sleeps. Neither Al nor I got up though, hoping that he was having a bad dream and would go back to sleep.

Now TJ usually sleeps through the night. In fact, it seems like he sleeps most of the day too! Occasionally he has had a dream where he whimpers and lets out muffled barks, and his legs jerk as though he is running, either chasing something or running away from it.

This time though it sounded less like dreaming and more like a warning, letting us know that something was amiss. The barking continued, building up in intensity instead of dying down. Whatever or whoever was outside the house wasn't being scared away.

I put on my slippers and hurried down the hall to find TJ



standing in his room facing the backyard, very alert. A quick check out the window didn't show anything, even with the outside light flipped on. After saying "No more barking!" authoritatively, I turned off the outside light and went back to bed.

A few minutes later, it started up again. I tried shining the flashlight out all of the windows in the room, not wanting to go outside in my slippers and pajamas. The flashlight didn't help much though. It only made a reflection on the glass that prevented me from seeing anything at all.

"TJ, no barking! Not scary." I repeated over and over. He finally curled up on his bed. Before heading back to our bedroom, I covered him from head to toe with one of Al's old t- shirts, hoping that would do the trick. Either that was the secret or the culprits went somewhere else, because that was the end of TJ's barking.

Perhaps the commotion was caused by squirrels digging around for more pinecones or other tidbits. Thankfully, I went right back to sleep and didn't wake up again until 10:00 a.m.

When I finally got up, the day was already in full swing and I was at least two hours behind schedule. There were several things requiring my attention all at the same time. Besides having breakfast ready, Al had thoughtfully already taken care of

TJ's needs. That was nice, as well as a big help!

The house was in disarray, kitchen chores were calling and my precious early morning hours reading the Bible and praying had disappeared. In addition to making a grocery list before going shopping, there was also an alert from a friend that someone had most likely hacked into one of our online accounts.

Confusion set in. It was a typical, unpredictable Monday! And I wasn't prepared for it, even after a restful Sunday! When I finally was able to sit down for a bit of quiet time, the first thing that came to mind was to thank God for the gift of "order."

Order? A scripture immediately popped into my head, something to the effect that God is not the God of confusion, but of order and peace! Jesus addressed this same idea with His disciples many times... "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? Since you cannot do this very little thing, why do you worry about the rest?" (Luke 12:25)

There was no need to worry. It certainly wouldn't add minutes to the day. God would help me figure things out when I turned everything over to Him.

Sure enough, with Al's help and the Lord's orchestration too, everything fell into place. There were no feelings of confusion, anxiety or of being worn out—only peace and gratitude. God is faithful!
